## Citizenship: preparing young people for life



Citizenship Day last week provided an exciting and valuable experience. It also provided us with a wealth of useful knowledge when planning our futures. All the Year 9 students attended a variety of activities throughout the day. There was an excellent 'Human Library' where 21 representatives of businesses from all over our region came to talk to

students. We had 4 minutes with each person. We had to determibe what type of work they did and by asking them questions, such as "What GCSEs/A-levels/Degrees do you need for this job?", to acquire inside knowledge of their work.

We also attended a talk by Teenage Cancer Trust telling us how to spot signs of early cancer and how to get it treated so we can stay well. The second talk was from a nurse from St Johns First Aid informing us about how to successfully be able to do CPR and use a defibrillator. After lunch we had a talk from a fireman about the dangers of house fires and how to deal with a fire in the home.

It is important to be aware of these potential dangers and the following simple questions should assist in ensuring that we are using it appropriately:

I. Is what I am sharing likely to put me or someone else at risk?

2.Am I posting information about me that I really want to share?

3. Will others feel hurt because of what I am saying or doing?

4.Do I really know who I am sharing this information with?

We invite the police to talk to students in school about the very real dangers of social media use and internet safety. We also advise all parents to talk to their children about such things. The golden rule is to stop if you have any doubt that what you are doing might be hurtful to someone; might be giving information that you don't want to share; might be illegal in the eyes of the law; or might be putting yourself at risk of harm.

I have just finished reading "The Underground Railroad" by Colson Whitehead. ## Family Focus: Fun Learning Workshops at CNS



At the end of a busy term we were pleased to offer opportunities for Chipping Norton Partnership School families from Years 4, 5 & 6 to come along and take part in Astronomy, Hockey and No Fear Shakespeare workshops led by teachers at Chipping Norton School.

We opened our Science laboratories to welcome over 90 people (45 families) to our Astronomy Workshop. This was led by Dr Hagan, Mr Turvey, Mr Prentice (CNS Science Department) and members of Chipping Norton Amateur Astronomy Group (CNAAG) - Robin Smitten, Doug Wells and John Vincent.

The families had the opportunity to look through telescopes to see the night sky and see some of the amazing planets in our solar system. They also took part in workshops based on how big our universe is using sweets and seeds to give an idea of scale, and had an opportunity to ask questions. They really enjoyed learning and working together in a very relaxed atmosphere.

Carol Hicks offered a non-threatening hour of hockey coaching for everyone. This is a great way to work with your child and again perhaps do something which you haven't done before. Mr Long (English Teacher) loves Shakespeare, and the idea that it is, and should be, accessible for all. His session offers a brief insight into one of Shakespeare's plays where families can learn together. This year he focussed on 'Titus Andronicus' one of

the following questions: How do we get there? Is there Life on Mars? What would we eat?

They were encouraged to think about the outcomes of experiments which they carried out in the laboratories using a range of equipment.

Using the Bunsen Burners always causes a lot of excitement and our students studied what happened to certain pieces of food when they were in a flame, such as how hot it got and what happened to it; they also discussed if some foods would be useful to take on a rocket ship.

Shakespeare's more violent plays. This is a story about a Roman General and how his actions finally decided his fate. Our families didn't have to do any writing but took part in some drama and role play. It is a fantastic way of dipping your toe into a subject which can be overwhelming and I know that everyone went away with a little more knowledge and maybe less fear of a subject which can sometimes be quite daunting.

Look out for our summer workshops, these will include Dance. Music and First Aid. The workshops are a really positive event where learning can take place in a supportive and relaxed environment providing valuable shared experiences for families.
