To do this the following changes will happen from September:

New menus to help promote healthy eating. These will be displayed in school and on our website.
New platters and dishes to cut down on packaging. Hot food will be served in washable containers to reduce material waste. Students to eat together in the Dining Hall. All hot food bought by students in 7,8 and 9 will be eaten at tables in the Dining Hall.
New all recyclable packaging for Years 10, 11, 12 & 13. Hot food taken out by older years will be in environmentally friendly, recyclable containers.
New regular Theme Days and Special Promotions.

These will promote healthier eating and better eating habits.


Art and Design & Technology Exhibition 2018



'Shards of Light' by Tristan Peissel (Year 10)

People are staring at me now. At first I bat them away lightly. Then someone goes for my mask and I don't think — just act. The resulting shove catapults him into a bank on the opposite side of the street, three floors up. The sirens start to wail — the banshee chorus ripping through my brain.

I turned right, then left, then right again, tearing through the puddles that littered the ground like strange portals to an alternate dimension. Will nothing shake these guys? Panicked, I make a stupid decision and charge off into a back alley. Suddenly faced with a cold, hard and unforgiving brick wall, my stomach drops to my boots and I feel bile start to rise in my throat. I spin on the spot and face my pursuers; two military grade Reapers, slowly advancing. Sweat trickled down the inside of my mask and makes its way down the nape of my neck. They were forcing my hand at this moment making me make the move I never wanted to have to make. It would be risky but if I valued my continued existence it was my only hope.

Reaching up, I grabbed my mask with both trembling, gloved hands and ripped it off my face, letting it fall to the ground with a clap like thunder. The Reapers stopped in their tracks.
