Year 10s experience the “World of Work”

This year 158 Year 10 students undertook work experience placements. There was a wide range of placements carried out in sectors such as Pharmaceutical, Aerospace, Marketing, Construction, IT, Financial Services, Manufacturing, Publishing, Hospitality and Engineering, to name but a few.

All the students have come back to school more confident than before and full of tales of what they did. We just cannot replicate in school the experience of being in an actual workplace and really appreciate the time and effort that businesses put in to make the placements a success.

Elizabeth and Jake spent the week at Abbott Diabetes Care in Witney.

“We started our week with a mock interview on which we got feedback later on in the week. We both found this very useful because it helped prepare us for the rest of the week and taught us valuable skills for interviews in the future - we were asked a series of questions about both our strengths and weaknesses and what we are aiming for in the future.

There were lots of different departments within the company which we were assigned to according to our CVs which we had to send during the application process. We were in separate departments for the week: one in Design Engineering (Elizabeth), and one in Technical Support (Jake). Design Engineering contained a lot of CAD work (Computer Aided Design), but also some work on the manufacturing floor, identifying and fixing problems with the robots. There was even the opportunity to design and then 3D print a small intricate box. Technical Support involved mainly Biochemistry, which was mainly made up of testing the diabetes strips and then creating graphs with the results. Towards the end of the week I then worked on the SEM (Scanning Electron Microscope), which I found very interesting as you could see detailed close-ups of tiny objects and substances (such as bees' eyes) and even the elemental composition within them.

On the last day we had to give presentations on our time at Abbott – luckily there was a lot to talk about and it has given us an insight into what the actual working world is like. Overall, we found the whole week very interesting and think it has set us up nicely for the future.”

The exciting bit about the award is that I won my category and received an iPad for myself and £1000 for the D & T department

and then surprisingly was named the overall winner on the night and received a huge shield. Both were presented to me by Lady Jay, High Sheriff of Oxford. On the evening I also met Richard Dick, Chairman of Lucy Group who started the award in 2010 to promote young engineers in Oxford. We have also been able to fund starter kits for the Computer Science department, soundproofing for the Music practice rooms, A-Frame easels for the Art department, German dictionaries for the MFL department, and benches, plants and paint to enable ASDAN students to complete their Community and Citizenship Unit by setting up an outdoor social area.

We have raised a large part of the money through events such as the Christmas Shopping Evening last year, serving refreshments at Chastleton House throughout the year, and providing a bar and refreshments at various school performances.

Art and Design & Technology Exhibition 2019

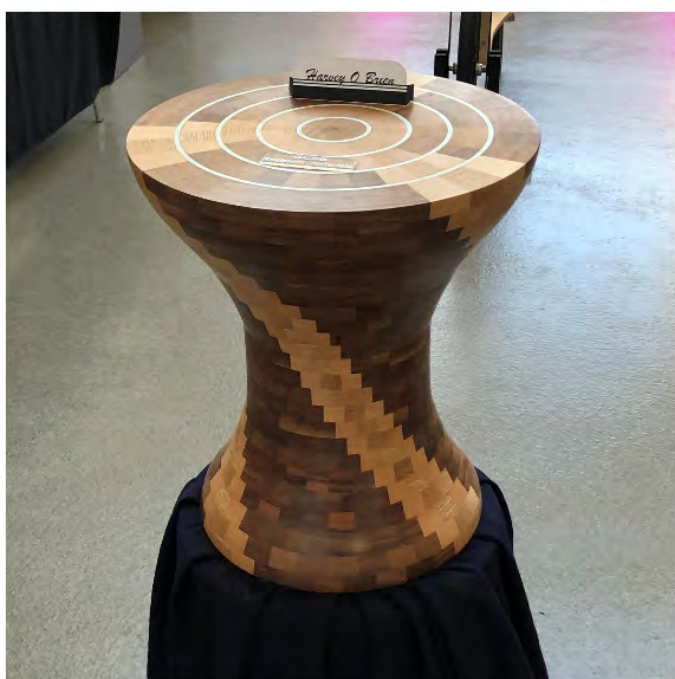

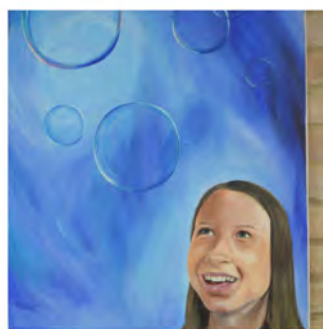
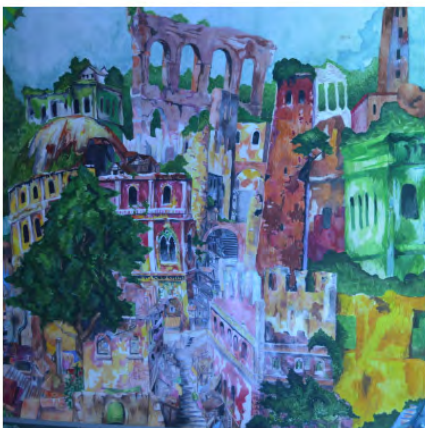
In Art, the quality of drawing and painting on display was equal to work you would expect to see in a gallery. The understanding of their topics and the quality of their research and development was truly remarkable.

Year 4 & 5 Maths Workshop

A fantastic group of young mathematicians came to CNS full of enthusiasm to do their very best. The pupils were split into groups and took part in a round robin of mathematical puzzles and games, including a maze. The ability to work together as a team was important in solving some of the puzzles, and this shone through.

The activities were led by teachers from the Maths Department and the

feedback was full of positive praise. They were very impressed by the mathematical knowledge and understanding shown and how our young mathematicians solved some very difficult puzzles and questions.

Year 10s lead Greek Mythology Drama workshops



The Year 10 Drama students had the exciting task of organising and developing their own performances and workshops to be delivered to Year 5 students at six different primary schools in the local area.

This is the second successive year I have had the chance to run this and the students love the opportunity. For me the most mesmerising moment is watching the confidence the students have in themselves when running the workshops with the Year 5s and the level of creativity the primary school students share in the process.

Georgia Bell sums up the task really well.

"We had to create a performance for primary school children. Because it was for 10 year olds, it had to be engaging, educational and have a message for the audience. We based the project around Greek myths. We incorporated a range of skills and styles we have learnt this year and drew on these to support our performances, such as

Epic Theatre.

After performing we assisted in the workshop, helping the students create their own version of the Greek myth 'Theseus and the Minotaur'. We started by experimenting with different ways of moving in unison, following different actions such as your daily routine, in time with each other. We used these skills to create short choral scenes based around the myth. It was fantastic helping the students realise their creative ideas."

Mark Zatyko explains how he (and most of the students involved) felt about the task.

"Before the first performance started I felt really nervous because I didn't know if the students would understand our story or the comedy we had put in the piece. During and after the performance though the students gave great feedback where they laughed and understood the message of our story. It was really satisfying when performing, especially when it went as we had planned and rehearsed.

Kids in the Kitchen



We know how much children like to cook, and wanted to offer some Year 5 pupils this opportunity at Chipping Norton School. Mrs Brown, our Food Tech teacher, led a cookery session where each child made 6 apple muffins. We were very impressed by the enthusiasm and dedication of the children; they listened to instructions and then went to their work stations and started the process of baking the muffins. It was so good to see them supporting each other, reading the recipe, mixing up their ingredients and then waiting excitedly for them to come out of the

oven.

This workshop also gave them an opportunity to learn some new skills such as weighing out ingredients, dividing the mix equally, timings, organisational skills, using the oven safely, working hygienically and of course washing up!

Thank you so much for being so fantastic, and we hope that you will be keen to bake at home, showing off what you learnt to your parents. Also a big thank you to Mrs Brown and Mrs Manning for their hard work.

Junior Extended Project



When I was in Year 9, at a different school, my Science class, made up of about 30 'top-set' students, was asked to hand in a project on photosynthesis, and we were told that we could produce whatever we wanted. I was the only one to hand anything in. When they were asked why they hadn't completed it, the rest of the class simply said that they weren't told how to do it, so they just didn't. Following this, I feel very strongly that students of all ages should have the opportunity to learn how to research independently.

At the beginning of this year, I therefore set up the Junior Extended Project open to all Year 9 students in order that they could have the chance to develop a passion or interest, even if it is outside of the conventional school curriculum.

The project, which was initiated just after Christmas, allowed the students to research a topic of their own interest. Based on this research, they then created a dissertation, artefact or presentation showing their findings, in a similar sort of way to the Extended Project for Sixth Form

students. Throughout the process, they were also assigned to a Year 12 'mentor' for subject-specific help.

Around the hand-in date, which was just after the Easter break, I was presented with 18 amazing projects. There was a very diverse range of projects handed in, from a student that had researched into the 'Extinction Rebellion' movement, and who had interviewed people at a protest, to a project on Space that was so complex it is like reading A Level work, to several interior design/architecture models. The list of amazingly high-standard projects is endless. Each one had obviously taken a great deal of effort and hard work, so thank you to the students for taking part. You should all be very proud of having completed the project.

The project was finalised with a presentation evening. This took place on Wednesday 12th June, and was a chance for students to exhibit the projects that they had produced. Parents and teachers alike were all impressed by the quality of work that they had all handed in.

Thank you to all of the mentors who helped out with the students, and also to parents and teachers that came to the presentation evening and were overwhelmingly complimentary of all the work handed in.

Next year, the project will be taken over by Amanda Antal, who I am sure will do a fantastic job of it!
