Christmas market trips



On 5 December 43 students set off from Chipping Norton School, their destination Cologne, Germany and the Weihnachtsmärkte (Christmas markets).

For centuries, Christmas markets brought cheer to weary villagers and added a touch of light and colour to the long winter nights. The precursor to Christmas markets is thought to be Vienna's Dezembermarkt (December Market), dating back to around 1296.

Emperor Albrecht I granted shopkeepers the rights to hold a market for a day or two in early winter so that townspeople could stock up on supplies to last through the cold months and Wintermärkte (winter markets) began to spring up all over Europe.

Over time, local families started setting up stalls to sell baskets, toys, and woodcarvings alongside others selling almonds, roasted chestnuts, and gingerbread. These were often bought as gifts to give away at Christmas. It was the winter markets

that eventually became known as Christmas Markets—the earliest of which are claimed to be in Germany: Bautzen in 1384, and Frankfurt in 1393. But Dresden's Strietzelmarkt may have been the first real Christmas Market, dating from 1434.

Today, during Advent, most towns in Germany have a Christmas market and visitors can try a range of delicious foods such as Raclette (melted cheese on bread), gebrannte Mandeln (candied, toasted almonds), freshly-grilled Bratwurst, Christstollen (Stollen) and Lebkuchen. Many other handmade items, toys, books, Christmas tree decorations and ornaments can also be found at a Christmas Market.

Arriving in Cologne, we headed straight for the first Christmas Market – the Fairy Tale market, glowing with twinkly lights and the air filled with a feast of smells and sounds of Christmas music. The following morning we started at the world famous Cologne Cathedral,

one of the most iconic buildings in Germany with an incredible history and a UNESCO World Heritage site since 1996. We toured the cathedral, admiring the Shrine of the Magi, a reliquary said to contain the bones of the Three Wise Men and the largest, most artistically significant example from the Middle Ages. We then climbed the North Tower - the second highest building in Cologne at 516 feet, and visited the Cathedral Christmas Market before heading to the Altstadt market and ice skating at the outdoor rink.

Our final market of the day was the oldest Christmas market in Cologne at Neumarkt, a magical market with stars in the trees surrounding the market. In the evening, we went to Aqualand – a highlight of the trip for many students. We arrived to a pool disco and laser show, followed by time on the many slides and whirlpools.

On our final day, we had a guided tour of the Lindt chocolate museum,

learning about the history of chocolate and how it is made today, ending with tastings at the chocolate fountain. After lunch in the harbour Christmas market we set off for home, exhausted but happy.

Thank you to the staff Mrs Cradock, Miss Richmond and Mrs Huddleston for accompanying the trip and to the students, who behaved impeccably whilst away. The trip will run again next December.

AIM 'A Christmas Carol' workshop

Miranda's Australian Adventure



For Sixth Form students this time of year is mostly about university: choosing courses, writing personal statements, visiting universities and picking your top 5. I had known for a long time that I was going to have a GAP year before going to university; both my older brothers did it and they came back with amazing stories of their adventures in countries I had never visited. I am pleased to say that I have now lived in Australia for 5 months and I have started my very own collection of adventures!

I am currently living and working in a boarding school called Pymble Ladies College in the suburbs of Sydney - search it up, it's just as posh at it sounds! I heard about this job through a contact of my dad's, but there are plenty of websites with similar jobs, so if I hadn't got this job, then there were still lots of other opportunities.

I applied in December 2018 by sending my CV and a covering letter to Pymble. I then heard in January that I was going to have a Skype interview with the director of Boarding. Due to the time difference I had a Skype interview at 7:00am, where I was questioned on parts of my application as well as other

questions like "what skills and qualities would you bring to Pymble?" Despite the unearthly hour (I have never been at my best at that time of day), I passed this stage of the process! Mrs De Bruyn was then asked to write a letter of recommendation and a couple of weeks later, I had an email offering me the job - I was ecstatic! Pymble Ladies College is a private school and they usually only take GAP students from other private schools that they are linked to. Coming from a state-funded school, it was an amazing achievement to be accepted!

My official title is 'GAP Staff' and my main roles are in the boarding house, where I wake up at 6:30am in order to wake the girls up at 7:00am. I then do other household chores, like emptying the dishwasher and checking the laundry room. Once the girls have had breakfast and are dressed in their immaculate uniform, I go around checking their rooms and deem if they are suitable enough for them to claim their technology - phones, laptops, tablets - from the office. The boarding house I am in is for Year 7, 8 and 9, so rooms can be a little messy. During the day I

work around the school, answering phone calls and running items around the campus to different departments. After school finishes at 3:15pm, I help the girls with homework or take them to any appointments they may have, usually orthodontist ones. Two days a week, I coach a Year 4 and a Year 5 cricket team, which is both adorable and rewarding, especially when they win their match at the weekend!

Luckily, I am not required to work in the evenings or on the weekends, so I have plenty of free time to explore the surrounding suburbs and different parts of Sydney. Quite a few of our weekends have been spent shopping as we haven't really had any beach weather yet because we are just coming into summer now. It may be Australia, but it can still get chilly sometimes! There are loads of amazing places to visit around Sydney and I am planning on visiting all of them.

At the end of September, we had a 2-week school holiday where Hannah, another GAP student, and I went to Noosa, Byron Bay and the Gold Coast. We explored beaches, national parks and a couple of waterfalls. On our walk up to the Byron Bay Lighthouse, we spotted some whales but were not so lucky in spotting any dolphins (or sharks, depending on your opinion). In Noosa, we spent countless days on the beach and wandering through the national park. In Gold Coast, we ventured up the 360° viewing tower, where you could see the whole of

the Gold Coast and its beaches.

The Christmas Holidays span the whole of December and January. I have planned to visit New Zealand for the whole of December and will return to Sydney in readiness for the Harbour Bridge New Year's firework display. I intend to see all the beautiful sights in New Zealand by travelling around the island by coach. I was a bit worried about being away from my family on Christmas Day, but I have some family friends who have invited me to spend Christmas with them - Grand Dog and Grand Di are great company, so I'm sure their family will take good care of me.

Moving away from home is hard and there is no doubt that it has been a life-changing experience, but I am learning a lot about myself and living independently is preparation for going to university and beyond. No matter how far from home you go, whether it's an hour drive, a four-hour train ride or, for me, a 24-hour flight, it's important to surround yourself with people you can talk to and remember that you're not alone.

If you are considering a GAP year then I would highly recommend taking one, especially if you're not 100% sure what you want to do after Sixth Form. It gives you an opportunity to explore and possibly help you realise what you want to do and, perhaps more importantly, who you really are as a person.

Sociology trip to Oxford Crown Court

On the 26th November, the Year 13 Sociology class went on a day trip to Oxford Crown Court.

After passing through airport-style security, we were ushered into Court 1.

The first case we watched was the sentencing of a young male found guilty of dangerous driving. This was especially interesting as we saw him via a live TV link to Bullingdon Prison. After a brief interlude, we then witnessed the closing remarks of a sexual assault trial. Many members of the group found this hard to watch.

Later in the morning, we had a short break, in which we spoke with the defence barrister from the previous case. It was intriguing to hear his opinion, as he believed the defendant

should have been handed a longer sentence!

The most serious case of the day came last. This case, a trial for attempted murder, was in the opening stages, unlike the previous two cases. Here we saw the jury, the victim as a witness and the defendant. We watched the evidence unfold as the prosecuting barrister asked the victim many questions about the events leading up to the attempted murder. We heard a complicated and sad story of disability, drugs, homelessness and domestic violence culminating in a stabbing attack. We are keenly following the outcome of the trial.
