Developing Our Sixth Sense

"What is it like to be a student in this school?" This is the most prominent question being asked in all schools up and down the country today. This interest existed before COVID, but the impact of school closures and disruption have raised the importance of knowing the answers and doing something with that information.

We are a listening school and you will be aware that we introduced our sixth sense student voice programme. In addition to the annual universal student survey (every summer - amongst all RLT schools), we introduced an additional programme that involves 29 members of staff meeting with one sixth of our students, six times per year. We met during w/b 10 January and have been studying the anonymised feedback from students and agreeing additional actions.

I intend to draw attention to this work in a separate letter. For now, I want to reassure you that we are taking extraordinary steps to ask the kinds of questions that schools might be forgiven for putting off for another day. We hope you will agree that a strong family is very honest with one another. Strong families never claim to be perfect, but they strive to be better tomorrow than they are today.

It would be very difficult to provide a summary of the latest findings, but we are pleased with the levels of safety and happiness students have reported, and their obvious affection for one another and the range of adults at CNS. But there are certainly some areas for us to work on, or perhaps themes that remain unclear and require even more exploration.

Turning Words Into Actions and Spaces

A clear message from the student voice work is the appreciation for new spaces for students to eat and socialise. The sixth form centre and new dining room (for year 10s and 11s) are of course completed and offer wonderful areas for those students. But they want and need more...

Work on our main hall is ongoing but we look forward to opening this area for our youngest students (years 7 to 9) in the month of March. It is becoming easier and



easier to imagine how this area will also form a beautiful public space for productions that we look forward to reviving later this year – just like we did in the olden days.



Meanwhile, we have been asking members of the student council to work with us and our amazing PTA to offer advice and guidance on how to transform additional outdoor spaces for students to socialise, eat and relax.

We plan to create a wonderful space in the rather tired looking tech courtyard area and then, once completed, look at other spaces around the school that students would seek and value.
