

Over the course of the last six months a small group of Six Formers, Charlie Jennings, Evie Wilkinson and Emily Sinton, have been taking part in a Young Enterprise event not dissimilar to what you would have seen in the TV programme, The Apprentice.

The group were challenged to make a recycled product and take it from the planning, production, and marketing phases through to selling. They have attended a number of trade fairs and markets to sell their products and are hoping to do well in the county competition this year.

The group first started by making and selling clocks made by upcycling old vinyl records. They were then advised that in order to show that the company had longevity they needed to create new products to diversify. The group decided to add bowls, still made from recycled records, to their portfolio and have recently created a third product, packs of coasters made from old CDs.

The company has worked collaboratively with students from Sidford School and have learnt how to run meetings in a professional manner, communicating with the other school, organising and arranging agendas ahead of meetings so they run smoothly, and demonstrating fantastic teamwork.

Emily Chambers (Year 11), Gold Medal winner at last year's New Talent International Youth Music competition,




performed the melodic and evocative 'Reverie' by Bottesini; it was a captivating performance.



### The Royal Society's Young People's Book Prize



The Young People's Book Prize is an opportunity for children to read new, interesting science books, and vote for which one they like best in the competition. As well as that, it supports the writing of outstanding and accessible STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) books for children who are up to 14 years old.

A small group of students from Year 7 met at lunchtimes with Mrs George to plan and discuss the books that had been shortlisted:

- '100 Things to Know About Saving the Planet' by Rose Hall, Jerome Martin et al.
- 'Agent Asha: Mission Shark Bytes' by Sophie Deen
- 'I Am a Book. I Am a Portal to the Universe.' by Stefanie Posavec and Miriam Quick

- 'Inventors' by Robert Winston
- 'Under the Stars' by Lisa Harvey-Smith.

We then presented the books to our Science classes, to give them an idea about what the books were about. Everyone in the class read different sections from all of the books, and looked at the illustrations. Each class then voted for their favourite book. All of the votes were added together and in the end our school decided on 'I Am a Book. I Am a Portal to the Universe' (the overall winner of the competition!).

We all agreed it was a very hard choice as all the books were wonderful - really interesting and great reads! Our school decided on this book, because it is full of bright and colourful pictures, really interesting facts that we hadn't known, and it wasn't off-putting for people who might find reading difficult, especially as everything was explained really clearly, without lots of dense text.

The sponsorship means that he is able to do training sessions in Spain, he has a team mechanic, gets to have specially set up training sessions and also has fitness sessions provided for him. Recently Ronnie has been on a fitness training session in Lincoln with ex-UK champion Danny Webb where he took part in track bike training, dirt bike training and fitness testing.

Ronnie really enjoys the speed and adrenaline that he gets from riding motorbikes reaching speeds of 120mph. He says it is also a fantastic way to socialise with people from all across the world and he has made many friends. Ronnie has also met a lot of famous people and loves the feeling of winning.

Ronnie has always had a rival in his races - his good friend Ethan Sparks who he has known since he was two years old. The families of the two boys are really good friends and Ronnie is excited as they have both signed contracts to now become teammates. Even though they will still be rivals they will be able to work together for their team.

Ronnie's aspirations are to make it into the British Talent Cup for the under 18s, which is the top level in the UK, where he will ride around world-renowned tracks such as Silverstone and Donnington Park. If he manages to qualify he will go into the European Talent Cup and hopefully this will secure a two-year contract extension staying with the team. This will give him a large amount of support to develop through the sponsorship. Ronnie will then hope to be offered the opportunity to become professional in the World Championship in MotoGP.

Ronnie recently finished in first position in the GP70 class at a FAB racing championship. His younger brother, Bill, a successful rider in the GP50 class, came fourth in the same event. Both boys have a very exciting future!

#### **Alumni News: Daniel Huddleston**



My name is Daniel Huddleston; I am an ex-student from Chipping Norton School, now a qualified physiotherapist working within the NHS. My A-Levels were Biology, Psychology and PE, alongside AS level Physics.

My journey began at Chipping Norton School when I was a timid and shy Year 7 walking into the hall on my first day. However, the 7 years spent at CNS helped me to develop to become the person I am today. I thoroughly enjoyed all my years at Chipping Norton School and look on these fondly as they shaped me and supported me to develop vital skills relevant to my role as a physiotherapist within the NHS.

During my time at Chipping Norton School I dived head first into any sport I was able to play, mostly football, athletics and cricket, but I have tried my hand at rugby representing the school a few times much to Mr Thomas' delight!

My time in Sixth Form at Chipping Norton school was by far the best years of school for me; being given the extra freedom as you develop to become a young adult. Sixth Form allowed me to study subjects I had a true interest in and for me, subjects that were directly related to physiotherapy. I was honoured to be Head Boy during my time at Chipping Norton School, not only did this allow me to proudly represent the school at a number of different events, but it also supported me to develop key skills for transitioning into the world of adulthood and life beyond Sixth Form. This included developing public speaking skills, improving communication, team working and project managing.

Some may say I have been in the fortunate position of always knowing that I wanted to be a physiotherapist and so this naturally involved going to university to study and train. This dream of mine began at a very young age from both personal experience of having physiotherapy and also seeing the wonderful work physiotherapists do to support people, having shadowed a number of them whilst at school and before going to university.

During my time studying at Brunel University London I have been fortunate to have worked in a number of hospitals (both before and directly during the Covid-19 pandemic) whilst also taking part in a number of exciting placements across London. This includes working in Kings College Hospital London where I spent 6 weeks working in their intensive care unit, a number of hospitals in and around Oxfordshire during the Covid-19 pandemic. I also worked with the professional rugby league team, the London Broncos, where I worked alongside the head physiotherapist treating and supporting the first team players.

I have learned a tremendous amount whilst spending over 1000 clinical hours within hospital environments whilst training to be a physiotherapist, both about myself and the current environment we are all in today. A lot of skills used during this time, which I am sure a lot of you have experienced over the last 2 years, such as resilience, compassion, determination and commitment, and having a willingness to learn were all first established whilst at Chipping Norton School and have continued to follow me today.

Your time at school is special and you should cherish each and every moment. It is not often that things are handed to you on a plate and often the journey may not be clear. But what is clear, speaking from experience is that Chipping Norton School is a fantastic place to learn, where support given is endless and if you decide to grasp every opportunity that is given to you both now and in the future, you will only continue to grow and develop.
