Wembley Trip

On Friday 1st December 50 students and 5 staff made the return to Wembley for the first time since the pandemic. Due to the cold weather many layers were needed and we all set off from the bus park excited to watch the England Women's v Netherlands Nations league international. Unfortunately Friday traffic meant we missed the first few minutes of the game but once we settled into our seats we quickly saw two Netherlands goals to put them 2-0 up at half time and England facing a mountain to climb in the 2nd half.

After some refreshments (both the players and the

students) the second half started well for England and they quickly got back 2 goals to level the game. With the game seemingly heading for a draw Ella Toone popped up at the back post to send the 70,000 plus fans wild as England completed the comeback to win 3 -2. A welcome return to Wembley for CNS and we hope it won't be so long next time before we get back.

Football update

The Under 13 County Cup competition is one of only two year groups that starts before Christmas as the winners feed into a national competition which takes place after Christmas. The Year 8 boys have had a wonderful series of games meaning they go into January's final against the winners of Warriner or St Birinus School.

In round 1, a home tie against a spirited Carterton side saw a great result of 10-0 to CNS. In round 2, a tough looking fixture away at last year's winners Cherwell (who we lost to 6-1 last year) brought out an excellent performance in the team to win 4-2. Round 3 was a tie against Cheney school at home. An excellent early performance meant CNS went 3-0 up and 4-1 up early in the second half but Cheney never gave up and the game went right down to the wire with CNS holding on for a 4-3 victory.

The semi final was against a strong Burford team. A couple of brilliant saves from goalkeeper Finley Ashworth looked like it was going to be 0-0 at half time until CNS popped up with a goal right on half time to lead 1-0. A rapid start to the second half meant it was clear CNS were on top and with some excellent football being played the second half meant CNS won 4-0 and a final at Oxford City FC awaits.

I spent my entire secondary education at CNS, starting Year 7 in 2012 and leaving the Sixth Form in 2019. Throughout this time, my career plan was always to become a teacher and I knew that university was the route for me upon leaving school.

After having visited Loughborough University on an open day, I quickly became sure it was the right place for me to continue my education. I made an initial application for Sport and Exercise Science and put all my eggs into the Loughborough basket by also having them be my insurance choice with another sports-based course. About halfway into Year 13, however, my passion for English grew and, after some research, I found out that Loughborough offered a combined degree in English and Sport Science. After a few phone calls with the admissions office - and having to write a new personal statement – I was given an offer which I gladly accepted.

Change also came during my third year.
Unfortunately, my initial plan to study abroad was unable to happen due to the Covid-19 pandemic and so I instead chose to take a placement year in industry here in the UK, finding work as a Classroom Assistant at Magdalen College Junior School in Oxford. Here, I was able to utilise my existing skill set by supporting the delivery of both English and PE lessons on a daily basis, whilst also improving my versatility across other subjects and taking on responsibilities including marking books, doing break / lunch duties and

accompanying school trips. It was the most wonderful, rewarding but also eye-opening year, both proving that teaching is definitely the route I want to pursue whilst also prompting my decision to take a year out between my undergraduate degree and PGCE (teacher training) to experience life away from education for a while.

This July, I graduated from Loughborough with a firstclass degree in English and Sport Science alongside the Diploma in Professional Studies gained from my placement year. And as I now take a temporary step away from education and have the time to reflect on my uni experience, I truly believe that it was made all the better for having the freedom to continue studying two subjects that I enjoyed. My studies remained varied and interesting throughout and I benefited hugely from being able to meet peers and lecturers alike from both sides of the course. During my time at CNS I was very much someone who thrived on having a plan and sticking to it, but my uni experience has allowed me to better embrace change and the potentially positive outcomes that can come as a result of things 'not going to plan'.

On 24 November, several sixth form students had the opportunity to visit FarmED - a local not-for-profit organisation that focuses on agro-ecological practices. The students embarked on an informative tour led by staff member Abi; she explained how the farm is using innovative practices to preserve fragile ecosystems. From rubbing soils to testing water pollution, the students learnt how to identify characteristics of healthy farmland. With the progress that had already been made on the farm since 2013, it was fascinating to observe the team's impact on the environment, as demonstrated by ecological surveys showing a massive increase in biodiversity.

After the captivating tour, the sixth formers met Caroline Lucas MP. Listening to Caroline's different perspectives gave the students an insight into challenges that conservationists face. She then discussed systematic changes that need to be made to reach affordable environmental goals. Finally, Caroline stated that FarmED is a template that can be replicated across the UK and is a window into future balancing of profits and sustainability.

ExtraTime Clubs at CNS




We have had a really good number of students taking part in the ExtraTime clubs this term, probably because there is so much to choose from!

Chipping Norton PTA Fundraising Report 2022-2023



Chipping Norton School has a small but very active PTA Committee which organises year-round fundraising initiatives to help pay for things that fall outside of the school's budget remit. We rely on the wider school community to make these initiatives a success; for example, buying raffle tickets at Christmas, baking a cake or taking part in the annual 'Stranger in the Window' local retailer competition.

Thanks to the grant application skills of Treasurer and PTA Secretary, Natasha Whitmill, one of the most effective fundraising activities involves submitting requests to the local council and the community funds of local businesses. Over the last year this has generated:

£1820 in grants from Chipping Norton Town Council £5000 from Evenlode Investments

£750 for rugby shirts from Owen Mumford £500 from the Co-op.

If you know of a local business that could be approached for additional funding, please let us know.

We would like to say 'Thank You' to everyone involved in these additional activities:

2 tearoom takeovers at Chastleton House raised £930

£600 from hosting the bar for school music events £2662 from the Christmas 2022 raffle £54 from 'Stranger in the Window' competition £1134 from donations via the Stripe portal.

All in all, the PTA has raised an impressive £13,450 for the school. The PTA has given £12,350 to numerous departments to buy kit and equipment including a new lighting desk, new textbooks for GCSE Computer Science, food processors, paints, modelling tools and scenery for our new Warhammer Club, a replacement laser cutter, audio visual equipment for the school library, themed fiction to support Health & Social Care students, plants for the Sixth Form area, Chromebooks, and even a cloned sapling of Sir Isaac Newton's original apple tree, 'The Gravity Tree'!
