This year 149 Year 10 students participated in work experience in the first week of July. 86% of students found places in Oxfordshire businesses with many going to small local companies. These businesses have been fantastic and continue to support the school year on year offering great opportunities for our students.

Again, we had some generous employers who took more than one student; for example of the ACE Centre Nursery School in Chipping Norton were very supportive and took 4 students this year. This year we had students placed as far as field as Ireland, Southsea, Chandler's Ford, London, Bristol and Towcester.

Chipping Norton School would like to thank all those employers who gave their precious time and kindly offered work placements for our students. Work experience gives our students an invaluable insight into the world of work and we really appreciate their support.

Performing Arts Events



Our students had a second opportunity to work with a professional choreographer in our Dance Intensive event this term. They warmed up through a series of Contemporary Dance style warm up sequences and games, and worked together to undertake creative tasks throughout the day. Students were imaginative and cooperative in their approach, leading to an excellent performance piece at the end of the day. Students enjoyed the input from the choreographer and benefitted from a real world experience as part of a dance company.

In June we took 60 students from Year 7, 8 and 9 to Chipping Norton Theatre to participate in a set of three Drama workshops. On arrival we sat in the auditorium where students got to see the stage and get themselves in the right headspace for the day. We then split into three groups to start workshops in mime, character development and mask work. Each workshop introduced the techniques with fun games and allowed students to explore the techniques using creative tasks and mini performance opportunities. The workshop leaders were very encouraging and helped students to feel comfortable in the space, supporting them in making the most of the opportunities the day presented.

All students had the chance to take part in the mime workshop on the stage which started completely in silence and showed how effective mime doesn't need any speech to be completely understood. It was brilliant to see students enjoying being on stage and feeling the buzz of the theatre. In the mask workshop each student was able to choose a mask which allowed them to embody a different persona, resulting in funny scenes influenced by the character each mask suggested. During the characterisation workshop students were given scenarios to participate in which fuelled their understanding of what it takes to develop a believable and effective character based on the situation. Students reflected on the day when we arrived back at school, everyone was inspired by the experiences of the day and were all very excited to hear about upcoming auditions for our next school production. Harwell Open Week



On Wednesday, June 26th, eleven Year 9s joined Mrs Craig and Mrs Eakins on a trip to Rutherford Appleton Laboratory for Harwell Open Week.

Making good time, we were able to start our day with the "Meteorite Man" who allowed us to handle a piece of Martian volcano! Keeping the theme of space alive, we listened to an enthralling talk on the creation of a supernova, right here in Oxfordshire, through the use of a petawatt laser focused on to a perfectly fabricated target. A petawatt is 10¹⁵ joules of energy per second. This can be envisioned as all the power from the Sun being focused to the point of a pin!

Next, we were able to explore how sensors are used in home automation during a hands-on workshop. In the "Marquee of Wonders" we experienced augmented reality, viewed beautiful fossils and learned the gruesome truth about the fate of our bodies in outer space. We then met up near the solar telescopes and were able to get an up-close perspective of the source of those scorching heat beams. So, it wasn't surprising that the greatest screams of delight came when we were shown the picnic tables in the shade!

Our day wrapped up with a tour of the world class rapid prototyping facilities that can perfectly emulate a banana and a Metrology lab that can machine to micrometre (10^{-6} m) precision; that's smaller than 1/100 of a strand of hair!

Overall, it was a fantastic opportunity for our future scientist to be inspired by the scientist of today.

Normandy 2024

On the first day, the students visited the buzzing market at Avranches where they could practise their French as well as sample some delicious food. Sunday was an active day where students worked in groups. They took part in archery, basketball trampoline and climbing. The instructions were all in French so plenty of learning was done.

Before heading back to the ferry, we headed to Omaha Beach. This was a very poignant trip this year as it was 80 years since D-day.

German Exchange 2024



Last month, thirty-one students travelled to beautiful Bavaria to spend a week in Nördlingen with their German exchange partners. In addition to attending school, the students visited Allianz Arena in Munich, Legoland and Augsburg.

It was great to see the Allianz Arena in the light of the Euros and all of the football fans were really impressed. We spent the afternoon shopping in Augsburg and had a lovely time in spite of the weather.

For our day in Legoland, the sun was shining and even though Miss Johnston's favourite ride was shut, we all thoroughly enjoyed ourselves.

We also had two days discovering the local town. Nördlingen is located in Bavaria, Germany. Its old town is encircled by well-preserved medieval walls with towers and covered parapet paths. The city centre is anchored by the massive Gothic St. George's Church. We all climbed over 200 steps up its Daniel tower to take in the spectacular views and see a stork's nest from on high.

We also visited the Rieskratermuseum, where the students discovered how the local landscape was shaped millions of years ago when a meteorite crashed into that part of Bavaria, creating a crater which can still be seen today.

Our students spent the weekend with their German host families, and there was even an opportunity for one of our students to participate in the annual Stadtlauf (town run). Very well done, Jude!

We are now looking forward to welcoming our new group of German students in September and planning next year's trip back to this picturesque region.



Throughout this academic year we had a total of 3,684 attendances at our various events planned by the Community Learning Team at CNS. The partnership primary schools have been invited to 17 sports events including tournaments and festivals, and 20 enrichment events including AIM workshops, Family Focus workshops, after school clubs and other one off activities. West Oxfordshire Athletics

On Thursday 13th June our Years 7-10 won the West Oxfordshire athletics held at Horspath athletics ground in Oxford for the third year in a row! Nearly 70 students ran, jumped and threw brilliantly and a particular highlight was our Year 8 boys setting a new 4 x 100m relay record of 52 secs which is great considering the record had stood since 2007!

Quadkids Athletics

Both our Year 7 and Year 8 boys and girls won the recent West Oxon competition and were excited to take part in the County Finals in Abingdon on Friday 12th July. This involved 4 students in each year group taking part in the 100m, 800m, long jump and vortex throw. The students ran, jumped and threw brilliantly with the Year 7s coming 3rd and the Year 8s coming 5th in the county.

Rounders

Year 9 girls won the West Oxfordshire tournament recently at Marlborough School beating Bartholomew, Henry Box and Burford Schools.

Cricket

After excellent seasons for the Year 7 and 8 boys cricket teams, both teams won their semi final matches and are now finalists in the County Cup. Year 8 have a County Cup final against Wheatley Park in the last week of term and Year 7 will face either Lord Williams or Burford in September.

Lacrosse

We had 10 teams participating in our first ever Lacrosse festival for Year 9 and 10 girls. The afternoon was a chance to introduce schools to the game of lacrosse with a coaching session and competition run by a national coach for the beginners, while slightly more experienced players went straight into a tournament.

Over 70 girls were involved on the day. Students who had never picked up a stick before enjoyed a great afternoon of learning a new skill and meeting new people and went home buzzing about their new experience.

The Chipping Norton first team girls can be very proud of themselves as they clinched a last minute winner against the Cheltenham Ladies' College first team to win 6-5. This was very impressive as they had a number of regional level players in their team. The South West coach was in attendance and has now asked for a number of our Chipping Norton's girls to attend the regional trials on the back of this performance.

Girls Coaching Academy

Six of our wonderful students have been changemakers in the world of girls in sport through their participation in a Girls Coaching Academy programme led by Olympic medallist Jenna Downing. The programme included several virtual workshops where the students considered the barriers to girls' participation in sport and what can be done to affect change. They then delivered several weeks of extra-curricular activities with Year 7 girls which was really well received. The programme culminated in a leadership day where the leaders gave a presentation to others, led a practical activity and completed a first aid qualification.

Well done Olivia, Poppy, Anna, Annie, Olivia and Megan. They all did brilliantly and we can't wait to see what they will choose to do next for girls in sport!
