Book Week 2025



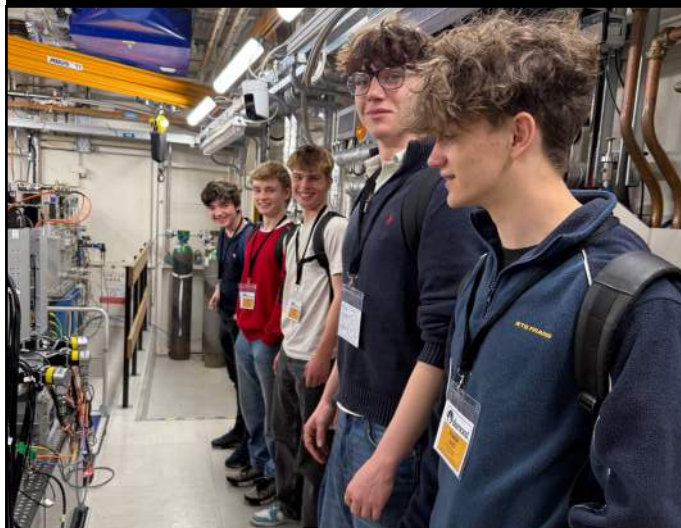

Physics Trip to Diamond Light Source



Mrs Eakins and Mrs Craig took twelve aspiring physicists and engineers to get a peek inside the guts of Diamond Light Source – UK's synchrotron facility and one of the world's biggest x-ray machines!

Diamond host investigations that have contributed to knowledge of the atomic structure of SARS-CoV-2, the development of a potential vaccine for foot-and-mouth disease, and the study of T-cells for cancer treatment. Outside the field of medicine, this remarkable tool has shed light (pun intended!) on cannon balls from The Mary Rose, fossils, coins, and more.

Our students had the opportunity to talk to beamline scientists on the physics behind their work as well as the work behind their career. They were able to get up close to magnets that shape the beam of electrons and wiggle and jiggle it to produce the x-rays used to probe specimens.

A highlight for one group was experiencing the density of tungsten as each was given a turn to hoist a chunk from one of the shutters. Meanwhile, the other group journeyed to the eye of the synchrotron, the very centre of this massive doughnut shaped building, to experience the architectural awe of what is Diamond.

Are you interested in becoming a teacher?

Chipping Norton School hosts trainee teachers every year because we recognise the importance of developing the next generation of teachers and because having colleagues involved in mentoring trainees has a positive impact on teaching practice across the school. Reflecting on and articulating what makes effective teaching on a regular basis is highly beneficial for school improvement. 'When I went to school, my teachers knew a lot about the curriculum, but seemingly little about how life really works. Questions about how to find the right direction in life and how to develop as a person could only be answered by a teacher who had been teaching their entire life. Therefore, I would like to become a teacher who not only helps students achieve in their subjects, but more importantly, who can guide teenagers through these formative years and answer their questions based on real life experiences. I am completing a one-year PGCE course that includes approximately 30% of the time at university and 70% of the time is hands-on teaching in placement schools. The course is tough - a lot of things are new, you have to learn to adapt very quickly and there are challenging situations. But there is no better feeling than ending a lesson knowing "yes, all that preparation worked!" and seeing students who were not filled like barrels, but enlightened like lanterns.'
