"My favourite thing was the sweets because they were nice to eat."


Year 8s Step Back in Time

In November, the History department took fifty Year 8 students to the Black Country Living Museum in Dudley. The trip transported students back in time to the Industrial Revolution which we have been studying this past term. Braving the cold and the snow, students experienced an old-fashioned school lesson where they were drilled in the three Rs, without any of the benefits of High-TEMPO! They then visited a variety of Industrial era buildings including houses, an ironmonger's, a blacksmith's, a sweetie shop and a replica of Newcomen's engine, with historic characters based at each site to tell its story and explain its historical significance.

The big finish came with an underground mine tour, requiring real courage from many of our students to enter the dark and cramped tunnels. The trip brought to life the living and working conditions students had learnt about in lessons and they took away a new appreciation of just how challenging life was as well as shocking and thought-provoking facts.

All of the museum guides who worked with our students praised them for their manners and behaviour and it was a pleasure for us as staff to spend the day with them out and about.









SPORTS NEWS: Outstanding Successes in all Sports

Netball: The Year 11s were outstanding at this year's WOSSP Netball Tournament, held at Bartholomew School in Eynsham. Playing against six other schools from across West Oxfordshire, the girls showed determination, skill and teamwork – and their efforts were rewarded as they finished joint first!



The U14 girls travelled to St Helen's and St Katharine's to compete against state and independent schools in a netball tournament. They won all their pool games, then their quarter and semi-finals, before losing to a very strong Didcot Girls' School side to finish a fantastic 2nd overall.

This term we hosted the WOSSP U14 Netball Tournament, and our squad were outstanding! They won every game, scoring an incredible 50 goals and conceding just 4 throughout the afternoon. This team continues to go from strength to strength — they are the netball champions of West Oxfordshire!

Congratulations to our Sixth Form Netball team who finished a very respectful 3rd place in the West Oxfordshire School Sports Partnership U18 Netball tournament! Your skill, teamwork, and sportsmanship made us proud.

Football: The Oxfordshire U16 County Football Rep team played a friendly against our U15 side. Our team played brilliantly to secure a 2-1 win.

School Council - Sustainability

The focus of this term's student council meeting was on the topic of 'Sustainability'. Our wonderful student council, standing at around 70 members strong, listened thoughtfully to an introduction from Miss Smith then discussed a range of ways in which our school could become more sustainable. Each house (Glyme, Stour, Windrush and Evenlode) was assigned an area to focus on, which included food, waste, student engagement and travel. All groups collaborated effectively to identify different strategies to tackle any identified problem areas.

Students pointed out that proper recycling is hard because there are no mixed bins in the dining hall, so all lunch rubbish goes in the main bin. They felt that eating green food was not popular, and people did not know where their food came from. For travel, students noted that driving is too common, and they wondered why local students and staff do not walk more. The council agreed that to fix this the new ideas must be exciting and stop students from feeling embarrassed about taking part.

Visit from Sean Woodcock, MP



We were delighted to welcome Sean Woodcock, MP, to Chipping Norton School for a visit that really mattered both to us and to him personally, having grown up in Banbury. He spent time with Mr Richter and Mr Ward discussing ways to improve the school bus provision and access to education in our rural community, which we know will benefit many of our students and families.

Afterwards, Mr Woodcock joined a lively question-and -answer session with students. Our younger pupils were quick off the mark – Year 8 students asked about making buses easier and more affordable for young people, while others wanted to know how the school could improve its approach to attendance .

Older students brought a wide range of thoughtful questions. Bee in Year 11 asked about inheritance tax and family farms, while Year 12s also tackled some big issues: Oscar on the cost of living, Thomas on

immigration and asylum, Lucille on the rise of populism, and Fraser on climate change. Questions also covered apprenticeships, digital safety, and youth voice, with Millie asking how young people can have more influence over decisions affecting their lives.

Throughout, Mr Woodcock spoke candidly about public speaking, being heard, the best and the most challenging aspects of being an MP and the often little-known ways cross-party discussion can shape consensus in Parliament.

We would like to thank Mr Woodcock for making time to engage with students across all years during what was a truly valuable visit for our community.

Non-School Uniform Day - Raising money for Thrive

Thrive is a charity that aims to provide education, enrichment, and mentoring for young people living in extremely challenging conditions. Thrive provides workshops and youth clubs to give kids constructive use of their free time and guide them in the right direction for their futures.

We raised money on the last day of Term 1 for Thrive and were pleased to raise £948 in our continuing efforts to support the local community. Thrive supports many of the children that attend schools in Chipping Norton and it was our pleasure, with the support of parents, carers and students, to gift them this money.

Aspire has now been tackling the most complex social issues in Oxfordshire for over 20 years. They support local people into and towards




employment and housing, as the most powerful way to break the complex cycles of homelessness, re-offending and poverty.

German Christmas Market Trip



Every year, the festive season at Chipping Norton School begins with a trip to the German Christmas markets in Cologne, and this year was no exception. The visit combined festive fun, cultural discovery and time with friends.

Cologne's markets date back to medieval winter fairs and, by the 15th and 16th centuries, had become closely linked with Christmas, selling crafts ideal for gifts.

Each year, over two million visitors attend Cologne's Christmas markets, including 55 pupils from Chipping Norton School this year. With six markets to explore – such as the famous Cathedral Market, Old Town Market and Angel's Market – the three-day trip was packed with activities. On the first evening, emerging from the underground, students were greeted by the smells of bratwurst, raclette and glühwein, sparkling lights around the cathedral, music, laughter and crisp winter air.

The second day included climbing the cathedral tower's 533 steps for spectacular views, followed by ice skating at the Old Town Market. Students also visited the Lindt Chocolate Museum, enjoying tastings at the chocolate fountain, before exploring Cologne's oldest Christmas market, decorated with stars in the trees. The evening ended at Aqualand, a highlight for many thanks to its slides and whirlpools.

On the final day, the group visited the harbour Christmas Market and enjoyed a ride on the Ferris wheel before travelling home.

Thanks go to Miss Richmond, Mrs Huddleston, Mrs Lawson, Miss Collett and Mrs Blundell for accompanying the trip, and to the students for their excellent behaviour. The trip will run again next December, with letters sent in March to eligible students.

This was a truly fantastic opportunity for our students to gain invaluable, real-world experience in a professional setting. The day provided them with a safe and supportive environment to practise the essential skills needed to succeed in competitive recruitment processes.

On this first event, we took three Y11 students and two Y13 students who have expressed an interest in apprenticeships. We were incredibly proud of their involvement; all five students represented the school superbly, engaging enthusiastically with every activity and impressing the attending employers.

The format for the day was as follows:

Introduction to local employers Top Tips session Team tasks **Networking** Online Assessment **Individual Mock interviews** Dos and Don'ts of CV writing / CV feedback

The students were very lucky to have so many local businesses supporting this event, with all the businesses currently looking to recruit young people this year. Companies that attended included Tokamak, Grundon, Morgan Sindall, Oxfordshire County Council, Blenheim, Nielsen, University of Oxford, OAS, Abbott, Leonardo and Bowmer & Kirkland.



Our students really engaged well and visibly enjoyed the whole process, particularly the challenging team tasks and the one-to-one mock interviews. The feedback from the students was very positive, with all of them recommending the event to others.

Furthermore, our students were very lucky to be offered work experience by some of the companies and also visits to their businesses to further their interest into a potential apprenticeship.
